

1. It's a Health Condition and a Societal Issue

CHANGE THE CONVERSATION

FROM:

TO:

2. Obesity Is Complex

"Solving" obesity is more than eating well and exercising.

Genetics, biology, socioeconomics and social factors all play an essential part. Each person's journey with this health condition is unique. While there are common contributing factors, we can no longer say it's caused by simply overeating or being "lazy."

CHANGE THE CONVERSATION

FROM:

It's simple: Just eat less and exercise more.

TO

Healthy eating and exercise are only one important part of treating obesity.

Managing weight can be hard, and people living with obesity can feel like they're failing. Negative conversations around the health condition can often make it worse. Together, we can create a support system that brings encouragement and positivity to the conversation.


CHANGE THE CONVERSATION

FROM:

I tried losing weight, but I always struggle to lose enough or can't keep it off. I don't have the willpower needed, and I'm letting myself and others down.

TO:

Lasting change takes time, dedication and a positive mindset. I won't get caught up in the negatives or setbacks. I will be a champion for myself and others on this journey.

CHANGE THE CONVERSATION

FROM:

Talking about living with obesity has never worked out in the past, so I don't feel comfortable talking about it here. I don't want to be shamed or put down.

TO:

This is no different from any other health condition where patients would get together to share stories and create conversations. There is no place for shame or stigma here because that only stunts real progress.
